Pench Tiger Reserve	 Context: The Pench Tiger Reserve in Maharashtra, is planning to relocate spotted deer and sambars from the reserve's eastern sector to the western side. This initiative aims to increase the prey base for carnivores within the reserve, promoting a healthier ecosystem. The deer will be captured from Bor Tiger Reserve, East Pench, and Chorbahuli areas. This project highlights ongoing efforts in India to conserve wildlife populations through habitat management.
	 About: Maharashtra, the third largest state in India, is a key protector of biodiversity and boasts six tiger reserves, tying with Madhya Pradesh for the most in the country. One of these reserves is the Pench Tiger Reserve, located in the northern part of eastern Vidarbha, spanning the Ramtek, Parseoni, and Saoner tehsils of Nagpur district. It is India's 25th tiger reserve and covers an area of 741.41 sq.km. The Pench Tiger Reserve, named after the Pench River, is home to a wide variety of flora and fauna, including tigers, leopards, sloth bears, Indian gaurs, wild dogs, and wolves, typical of central India. It is well-connected to other reserves such as Kanha, Pench (M.P), Tadoba Andhari, Navegao-Nagjhira, and Bor Tiger Reserves. The Pench River, which splits the reserve in half, and the Totladoh reservoir, built on the river, are crucial for the wildlife in the reserve.

<image/>	 Context: Devotees visiting Mahalaxmi Temple in Kolhapur will not be able to see the original idol of the goddess on April 14 and 15 as the Archeological Survey of India (ASI), New Delhi will inspect and conserve the idol. The recent ASI's research finds that the idol is damaged. About: The temple is named after Ambabai/Mahalaxmi, where it is believed the divine couple resides. It is an architectural relic of the Chalukya empire, likely constructed around 700 AD. The image of the four-armed and crowned goddess, mounted on a stone platform, is crafted from sandstone and stands at a height of 2 feet 8.5 inches. A stone lion, representing the goddess's vahana, stands behind the statue. The temple also features a carving of the Shri Yantra on one of its corners, opposite to the mahakali idol. Unlike most Hindu sacred images, which face north or east, this deity faces west (Pashchim), allowing the setting sun's rays to directly illuminate the idol's face on specific days (31 January, 01-02 February, 09-11 November) through the mahadwar (main entrance).
Over 5k in 14 border villages with 2 EPICs to vote in state	 Context: Citizens of 14 villages in Jiwati taluka in Chandrapur district bordering Maharashtra and Telangana have two voter cards. Besides availing govt benefits, they have been voting in both states Just as another poll looms, close to 5,600 voters from these border villages will vote in Maharashtra in the first phase on April 19. Many had voted in the Telangana assembly six months ago. The villages include Maharajguda, Mukadamguda, Paramdoli, Paramdoli Tanda, Kotha, Lendijala, Shankarlodhi, Padmavati, Antapur, Indiranagar, Yesapur, Palasguda, Bholapathar and Lendiguda.
