World Health Day

- World Health Day is celebrated annually on April 7th.
- It was established by the World Health Organization (WHO) in 1948

About:

- In 1948, the WHO held the **First World Health Assembly**.
- The Assembly decided to celebrate 7 April of each year, with effect from 1950, as the World Health Day.

Theme:

- The theme for World Health Day 2024 is "My health, my right".
- This theme emphasizes the importance of ensuring everyone, everywhere has access to healthcare services, information, and education to live a healthy life.

Nag River system to be scanned for flood mgmt

- The Maharashtra state irrigation department has suggested that the Nagpur Municipal Corporation (NMC) conduct a detailed hydrological study to tackle the flooding issues in Nag River.
- This suggests that the current flood management strategies for the Nag River may be inadequate.

About:

 The Nag River, the lifeblood of Nagpur city, Maharashtra, lends its name to the city itself.

Kev Points:

- Origin: Lava Hills, near Wadi
- Length: Approximately 17 km within Nagpur city limits
- Tributaries: Merges with Pioli rivers near
 Pawangaon, Pora river near Titur
- Joins the Kanhan River, part of the Kanhan-Pench river system

Final voter list released, gender disparity at 0.1%

 The final voter list has been released, indicating a very small gender disparity of just 0.1%.

About:

- The statistical data for Nagpur constituency indicates that the difference between the number of male and female voters, which was at 4.27% in 2009, has reduced to a mere 0.1% or 44,055 voters in the 2024 voters list.
- The data also shows that this gender disparity in the voter list in 2014 was 4.33%, which reduced to 2.56% in 2019.

Versova Bandra Sea Link: 15% civil work completed

- The Versova-Bandra Sea Link is under construction and 15% civil work has been completed
- The project deadline has been extended to May 2028.
- This is a revision from the previous target of December 2026.

About:

- The Versova-Bandra Sea Link, also known as the Swatantrya Veer Savarkar Sea Link, is a massive bridge under construction in Mumbai
- It's part of the second phase of the city's Coastal Road project.

Key points:

- Length: 17.17 kilometers (10.67 miles)
- Purpose: Reduce traffic congestion on the Western Express Highway and Mumbai Suburban Railway.
- Start and End Points: Connects Bandra-Worli Sea Link to Nana Nani Park in Versova.

Formulate animal welfare committee in state: AWBI

- The Animal Welfare Board of India (AWBI) encourages states to establish their own Animal Welfare Committees.
- These committees would work alongside AWBI to improve animal welfare within the state.

Key Points:

- Purpose:
 - Address animal welfare concerns specific to the state.





- Implement national animal welfare guidelines at the state level.
- **Composition:** Likely to include representatives from:
 - Government departments (Animal Husbandry, Veterinary Services)
 - Animal welfare organizations
 - Veterinary professionals

Benefits:

- More focused attention on animal welfare issues in the state.
- Improved enforcement of animal welfare laws.
- Increased collaboration between stakeholders.

Greens raise concern over part of lake drying

- Local environmentalists, often referred to as "Greens", are expressing concern over cracks that have developed in the bed of the partially dried-up DPS lake, Nerul.
- Experts believe that the reason behind this could be the uneven drying of the lakebed or a drop in the water table.

About:

- DPS Lake is a 30-acre wetland located in Nerul, Navi Mumbai.
- It's known for attracting flamingos and other birds, making it a bit of a bird watcher's paradise.
- There have been efforts to conserve the lake as a habitat, and even plans to build watchtowers for visitor.

Regression among Marathas, 84% deserving of quota: Panel

 Maharashtra State Backward Class Commission said that the Marathas constitute 28% of the state population but display "exceptional backwardness" and 84% of them belong to the 'non-creamy layer' 'which deserves an adequate reservation in employment and education as held in Indra Sawhney" case.

About:

 The report of the commission, headed by Justice (retd) Sunil Shukre, forms part of the state's reply in HC to petitions raising a constitutional challenge to the 10% Socially and Educationally Backward Class (SEBC) Act for a Maratha quota in Maharashtra, reports Swati Deshpande.

One in five BEST buses now electric makeup 1.6% of all EVs in Mumbai


- Mumbai has made significant progress in electrifying its public bus system.
- One in five of the city's BEST buses are now electric, representing 1.6% of all electric vehicles (EVs) in Mumbai.
- This shift towards electric buses helps reduce emissions and improve air quality in the city.

CRPF Valour Day

- CRPF Valour Day is observed every year on April 9th.
- It honors the exceptional courage displayed by CRPF personnel at Sardar Post in the Rann of Kutch, Gujarat, in 1965.

About:

- It was on this day in 1965, a small contingent of CRPF created history by defeating an invading Pakistani army, several times larger, at the Sardar Post located in the Rann of Kutch, Gujarat.
- The CRPF men eliminated 34 Pakistani soldiers and captured four alive.







World Homeopathy Day

- World Homeopathy Day is celebrated every year on April 10th every year.
- It honors the birthday of Samuel Hahnemann, the founder of homeopathy.
- It's a day to raise awareness about this alternative medical system that uses natural substances in minimal doses to stimulate the body's healing response.
- It aims to:
 - Increase public understanding of homeopathy.
 - Improve accessibility of homeopathic treatments.
 - Address challenges faced by homeopathy and explore its future potential.

Theme:

- The theme for World Homeopathy Day 2024 is 'Empowering Research, Enhancing Proficiency: A Homeopathy Symposium".
- This theme underscores the significance of continuous research in homeopathy and the need to upgrade capability in its training to give better medical care results.

Did you know?

- Mahendra Lal Sircar was the first Indian who became a homeopathic physician.
- The Calcutta Homeopathic Medical College, the first homeopathic medical college was established in 1881.

13L first-time young voters in Maharashtra

- As many as 12.87 lakh young first-time electors in the state will vote in the Lok Sabha election.
- Of these, 7.59 lakh are male as against 5.27 lakh female voters.
- Maharashtra's voter registration numbers in this group are up from the previous election, but still less when compared to the other states.
- Their overall registration in the state is less than 30% of the total 9.24 crore voters.
- The projected population in this demographic is a little under 4.9 crore which means barely 38% first-time voters are on the rolls.
- Young and middle-aged voters collectively constitute over 50% of the voters' list.

ICCR Foundation Day

- The Indian Council for Cultural Relations (ICCR) celebrates its foundation day on April 9th.
- It was established in 1950 by Maulana Abdul Kalam Azad
- He was India's first Education Minister.

About:

- The day marks the beginning of India's cultural diplomacy efforts, promoting mutual understanding and cultural exchange between India and other countries.
- It marks the establishment of India's soft power diplomacy, which has been a key component of the country's foreign policy
- The ICCR Headquarter is situated at Azad Bhavan, I.P. Estate, New Delhi.
- Its regional offices are in Bangalore, Chandigarh, Chennai, Cuttack, Goa, Guwahati, Hyderabad, Jaipur, Kolkata, Lucknow, Mumbai, Patna, Pune, Shillong, Thiruvananthapuram & Varanasi.

Maharashtra aims to export 5,000 tonnes of mangoes to US, Europe

- The Maharashtra State Agricultural Marketing Board (MSAMB) aims to export 5,000 tonnes of mangoes this season.
- This is a significant increase from the previous season, which saw lower exports.
- The mangoes will be processed and exported from MSAMB facilities.
- The target markets are developed countries like the US and Europe, where there is a high demand for Indian mangoes, particularly Alphonso and Kesar varieties.
- This focus on developed markets is due to the expectation of better returns for farmers.

National Zoo Lovers Day

- National Zoo Lovers Day is celebrated every year on April 8th.
- It's a day to celebrate our love for animals and the important role zoos play.

Key Points:

 - Education Zoos teach us about wildlife and habitats.
 - Research Scientists study animals at zoos to improve their well-being.

- Arignar Anna Zoological Park was the first Zoo established in the country in 1855
- Arignar Anna Zoological Park (Vandalur Zoo) in Chennai holds the title of the largest zoo in India
- Maharajbagh Zoo is the smallest zoo in India.

Key Points:

- This day also serves as a reminder of the importance of ensuring every mother has a safe and healthy experience throughout motherhood.

Theme:

 The theme of 2024 is "Remain at home amid coronavirus, protect mother and infant"

White Ribbon Alliance India (WRAI)

- The White Ribbon Alliance India (WRAI) is a grassroots movement advocating for the health and rights of women and newborns in India.
- It functions as a broad coalition bringing together individuals, organizations, healthcare professionals, and even government officials.

Over 100 teams to be deployed for Dharavi survey

 A large-scale survey of Dharavi, one of Asia's biggest slums, is set to begin with over 100 teams being deployed.

Key Points:

- This initiative is linked to the ongoing Dharavi redevelopment project
- This redevelopment project is aimed at transforming the slum into a modern and planned urban area.
- The purpose of the survey is likely to gather data on various aspects of Dharavi, such as the number of residents, demographics, property ownership, and infrastructure needs.
- The collected data will be instrumental in planning and executing the redevelopment project effectively.

Metro One introduces convenient wristband payment system

Metro One (Versova-Andheri-Ghatkopar)
 has unveiled an innovative ticketing system
 featuring a wearable wristband known as
 TapTap, designed for contactless payments
 during metro commutes.

About:

- This TapTap band is made from environmentally friendly silicone-based material, ensuring it is non-allergenic and gentle on the skin
- Metro One launched TapTap with a special introductory offer priced at Rs. 200, allowing commuters to "wear their tickets instead of carrying them."
- By simply tapping their wristbands at the AFC gates of Mumbai Metro One, passengers can seamlessly embark on their journeys.

World Parkinson's Day

 World Parkinson's Day is observed every year on April 11th

This day serves two key purposes:

- 1. Raising Awareness:
 - Parkinson's disease is a chronic neurodegenerative disorder impacting millions globally.
 - World Parkinson's Day brings attention to this condition, its symptoms, and the





challenges faced by patients and their families.

2. Honoring Dr. James Parkinson:

 The day also coincides with the birthday of Dr. James Parkinson, who first described the condition in 1817.

About:

- In 1997, the European Association for Parkinson's Disease (now known as Parkinson's Europe) announced that April 11 will be observed as World Parkinson's Day every year.
- The World Health Organization (WHO) also co-sponsored the initiative.

Theme:

 The theme for World Parkinson's Day 2024 is "Finding Your Light."

International Day of Human Space Flight

- The International Day of Human Space Flight is celebrated annually on 12 April.
- It marks the anniversary of the first human space flight by Yuri Gagarin in 1961.

About:

 It was proclaimed at the 65th session of the United Nations General Assembly on 7 April 2011.

Key Points:

- This day celebrates the dawn of the space age and the incredible achievements in space exploration.
- It also highlights the importance of space science and technology for our well-being and sustainable development.

Theme:

- The theme for International Day of Human Space Flight is "Encourage scientific curiosity".
- It urges individuals and communities to embrace curiosity as a driving force for discovery and innovation

Did you Know?

 Yuri Gagarin was the first human to travel to space.

Pune district hosts highest registered voters in Maharashtra

- Pune district has the highest number of voters in the state with 82.8 lakh voters according to the latest data from the state's chief electoral office.
- The Mumbai suburban district follows next with 73.5 lakh voters.
- The registered voters in **Thane district are 65.8 lakh**.

About:

- In the last three weeks, the state has added 3.2 lakh voters to the electoral roll.
- Pune district has the highest number of registered voters because it has four parliamentary constituencies.

India, Germany give patent to SUK researchers

- Two researchers at SUK have made a significant contribution to clean energy development.
- Their study on water splitting using nanocomposites for hydrogen production has been granted patents by both the Indian and German governments.
- This technology has the potential to create a more sustainable method for hydrogen fuel production.

About:

- Prof Dr Sagar Delekar, Professor from the Department of Chemistry, Shivaji University, and his research student Pramod Abhangrao Koyle conducted the research.
- This includes producing green hydrogen from natural sources such as water and sunlight, using it as a fuel, and reducing carbon emissions.
- The research was published in American Journal of Applied Nanomaterials and International Journal of Hydrogen Energy.

Mahatma Phule memorial set for expansion

- MH Deputy chief minister Ajit Pawar said that an expansion of the Mahatma Jyotirao Phule Memorial in Pune is being planned, and land acquisition would be expedited for the same.
- It is in view that the existing memorial appears to be congested.





About:

 Mahatma Jyotirao Phule (1827-1890) was a pioneering Indian social reformer who fought for equality for all.

Key Points:

- Anti-Caste Activist: Phule vehemently opposed the discriminatory caste system, particularly the plight of untouchables and lower castes.
- Education for All: He and his wife Savitribai Phule, a remarkable figure in her own right, were champions of women's education. They opened the first school for girls in India in 1848.
- Satyashodhak Samaj: In 1873, Phule founded the Satyashodhak Samaj ("Truth-seekers' Society") a society promoting reason, critical thinking, and social justice for all.

Climate vulnerability threat

- For over 24 years now, the average annual temperature in Maharashtra has been recorded as above normal level.
- According to the India Meteorological Department (IMD), the average annual temperature in Maharashtra has risen one degree above normal level.

About:

- Recently, the year 2023 was officially declared as the warmest year globally with average temperature higher than the average of the 1850-1900 pre-industrial level by 1.48 degrees Celsius, and 0.17 degrees Celsius higher than 2016.
- Maharashtra, too, has recorded an increase in temperature since before 2000.
- As per the IMD data, between 1875 and 1970, average temperature in Maharashtra was recorded below normal level by one degree except for a few incidents.
- However, this situation began to change gradually and the number of incidents where average temperature was recorded above normal level increased between 1970 and 2000.
- The change was seen significantly post 2000 when average temperature in Maharashtra was constantly above normal.
- By 2022, the temperature was recorded as one degree higher than normal in Maharashtra.

Pench Tiger Reserve

- The Pench Tiger Reserve in Maharashtra, is planning to relocate spotted deer and sambars from the reserve's eastern sector to the western side.
- This initiative aims to increase the prey base for carnivores within the reserve, promoting a healthier ecosystem.
- The deer will be captured from Bor Tiger Reserve, East Pench, and Chorbahuli areas.
- This project highlights ongoing efforts in India to conserve wildlife populations through habitat management.

About:

- Maharashtra, the third largest state in India, is a key protector of biodiversity and boasts six tiger reserves, tying with Madhya Pradesh for the most in the country.
- One of these reserves is the Pench Tiger Reserve, located in the northern part of eastern Vidarbha, spanning the Ramtek, Parseoni, and Saoner tehsils of Nagpur district.
- It is India's **25th tiger reserve** and covers an area of 741.41 sq.km.
- The Pench Tiger Reserve, named after the Pench River, is home to a wide variety of flora and fauna, including tigers, leopards, sloth bears, Indian gaurs, wild dogs, and wolves, typical of central India.
- It is well-connected to other reserves such as Kanha, Pench (M.P), Tadoba Andhari, Navegao-Nagihira, and Bor Tiger Reserves.
- The Pench River, which splits the reserve in half, and the Totladoh reservoir, built on the river, are crucial for the wildlife in the reserve.

ASI to conserve Goddess Mahalaxmi idol on Apr 14-15

- Devotees visiting Mahalaxmi Temple in Kolhapur will not be able to see the original idol of the goddess on April 14 and 15 as the Archeological Survey of India (ASI), New Delhi will inspect and conserve the idol.
- The recent ASI's research finds that the idol is damaged.

About:





- The temple is named after Ambabai/Mahalaxmi, where it is believed the divine couple resides.
- It is an architectural relic of the Chalukya empire, likely constructed around 700 AD.
- The image of the four-armed and crowned goddess, mounted on a stone platform, is crafted from sandstone and stands at a height of 2 feet 8.5 inches.
- A stone lion, representing the **goddess's vahana**, stands behind the statue.
- The temple also features a carving of the Shri Yantra on one of its corners, opposite to the mahakali idol.
- Unlike most Hindu sacred images, which face north or east, this deity faces west (Pashchim), allowing the setting sun's rays to directly illuminate the idol's face on specific days (31 January, 01-02 February, 09-11 November) through the mahadwar (main entrance).

Over 5k in 14 border villages with 2 EPICs to vote in state

- Citizens of 14 villages in Jiwati taluka in Chandrapur district bordering Maharashtra and Telangana have two voter cards.
- Besides availing govt benefits, they have been voting in both states
- Just as another poll looms, close to 5,600 voters from these border villages will vote in Maharashtra in the first phase on April 19.
- Many had voted in the Telangana assembly six months ago.
- The villages include Maharajguda, Mukadamguda, Paramdoli, Paramdoli Tanda, Kotha, Lendijala, Shankarlodhi, Padmavati, Antapur, Indiranagar, Yesapur, Palasguda, Bholapathar and Lendiguda.

International Turban Day

- International Turban Day is observed annually on April 13th
- It is a day to celebrate Sikh heritage and raise awareness about the significance of the turban in their culture.

Key Points:

Symbol of Faith:

The **turban, also known as a dastar**, is more than just headwear for Sikhs.

• It's a mandatory part of their faith, representing commitment, self-respect, and spiritual purity.

Raising Awareness:

 This day aims to educate the public about the Sikh religion and combat prejudice against those who wear turbans.

Promoting Understanding:

 International Turban Day encourages interfaith dialogue and cultural exchange, fostering a more inclusive and harmonious society.

About:

- The day has been celebrated **since 2004**.
- This is to bring awareness of the strict requirement on Sikhs to put the turban as a mandatory part of their religion.
- The 2024 Turban Day marks the 555th birth anniversary of Guru Nanak Dev and the festival of Baisakhi.
